Pupil Progress

ESPS is an ambitious school, and the Governors, like the staff, want every pupil to be supported to achieve their full potential. This ambition is more difficult during the challenges of Covid, but the determination remains, and our children have made phenomenal progress this year. There is limited formal data following the cancellation of SATs, but Year 6 sat previous SATs papers and did exceptionally well. They outperformed compared to their predicted grades, and progress versus their KS1 levels was incredibly high.

The school elected to carry out the new Y4 multiplication tables check, which was optional for primary schools this year. Despite this being a new test with minimal time for each question, approaching half of pupils managed to get full marks, with the majority of others close behind.

Year 1 impressed with their Phonics Screening results, performing significantly better than expected based on predictions immediately post-lockdown.

It has been an undeniably challenging year, and some gaps in learning remain. The school has an effective plan to fill these gaps, with a focus on targeted interventions at school. This echoes the school's general approach to

promoting progress for all, and effectively differentiating to meet the learning needs of a wide range of abilities. Targeted interventions continued to take place virtually during lock down and the additional Covid catch-up budget has largely been allocated to additional resources to provide small group support and interventions. ESPS Curriculum update

The Governors have long been confident that East Sheen Primary provides a broad, balanced and ambitious curriculum to all our children. However, we regularly carry out subject conferencing to ensure that the curriculum continues to enrich the education of ESPS pupils, as well as meeting all requirements of the national curriculum.

Governors have focused this academic year on reviewing the intent, the implementation and the impact of ESPS's curriculum across the 'foundation' subjects (beyond the 'core' subjects of maths, English and science). To do so we have met – virtually –

with subject leaders in most of those subjects. We have been extremely impressed by the level of subject knowledge, the innovation and above all the enthusiasm and passion of the teachers. In particular we have been keen to understand how the curriculum is sequenced across year groups, such that children can build on their knowledge as they move through the school, and how learning in one subject area is complemented by that in another.

We are also excited that both the French and music provision at ESPS will be refreshed and expanded for the next academic year and look forward to seeing how all children can benefit from these changes.

An Environmentally Intelligent School

At our recent governors' strategy day, we explored further our three-year goal – for ESPS to become an environmentally intelligent school which enables our pupils to understand and think critically about environmental issues, promoting global citizenship, responsibility and leadership.

An environmentally intelligent school is more than simply an eco-friendly school. Of course, we want our children to care about turning the lights off, to recycle where possible and to reduce single use plastic, but more than that we want them to think deeply about the challenges and choices that must be made. We want to make sure that we reach beyond the conventional curriculum and explicitly involve Critical Thinking at all stages, leveraging our status and outstanding practice as a Thinking School.

Our intention is to embed environmental intelligence across the curriculum, so that each year group has a clearly defined and age-appropriate environmental issue to explore. We are planning to draw on the expertise and support of the wider community – parents, carers, local businesses and local government. We will make use of outdoor learning across all year groups, exploring not only our wonderful grounds but also Richmond Park, Barnes Common and the River Thames.

Air Quality

We continue to work in conjunction with the LBRuT to monitor the levels of Nitrogen Oxides ('NOx') present in the air in and around the school. The latest data shows that NOx levels on site remain well below the legal threshold. The school's boundary and green wall are very effective at ensuring air quality in the playgrounds and classrooms is closer to that of Richmond Park than that of the Upper Richmond Road. Unsurprisingly, pollution levels at our monitoring locations have shown marked reductions during the lockdown periods and relative to the previous year. We are looking at what other measures could be implemented to further monitor and improve air quality at the school. Graham Dyer

We reiterate the following advice when travelling to and from school:

- When walking, cycling or scooting: use a route that avoids busy roads
- Walk, cycle or scoot to school. Exposure to air pollution can be higher inside cars
- Don't idle
- Enter/leave school by the closest entrance and keep off the road as long as possible
- Keep away from the kerbside. It's safer too!

Finance

A new financial year, new financial challenges!

Last year's financial surplus was somewhat larger than expected at the time of the last newsletter, reflecting the continuing spending uncertainties we experienced in the Spring term. But this contrasts with the current year's budget deficit, of an almost equal amount. This was always expected as we seek to catch up with spending on resources that were not acquired during the last, pandemic hit, year, and unspent portions of the Sports Premium Grant that we were allowed to carry over to this year.



We also have the benefit of Covid related grants from the government of almost £45k this year. The scheme will continue until the Summer of next year providing further additional, but smaller, grant monies in that financial year too. This year's grant is being used to employ additional classroom assistant time as well as extra working hours for existing staff. This will ensure support is available for pupils to make good progress if they are struggling on their return to the classroom as a result of lost face to face education last year. Current indications are that this is money well spent!

COVID Catch-up

The government has provided additional funding to schools for the 2020 to 2021 academic year (a grant of £80 per pupil) to spend on initiatives to support pupils who have missed learning during school closure as a result of the pandemic.

Within ESPS we value highly the impact of human resources in delivering progress in children's learning. As such, the catch-up funding at ESPS has been allocated to employing additional teacher and teaching assistant time. This strategy is supported by research undertaken by the Education Endowment Fund, 'There is extensive evidence supporting the impact of high quality one to one and small group tuition as a catch-up strategy'.

The teaching staff have been allocated to certain year groups where the need is assessed as greatest, protecting 'bubbles' as far as possible.

The impact is that we have seen children receiving bespoke interventions that address gaps in learning and understanding, enabling them to make good progress. The 121 intervention doesn't just deliver academic benefits but also supports well-being. This has helped children with the transition back into school, easing anxieties as they know they will receive support to catch up.

We aim to form partnerships with industry and academic institutions, and are passionate in our belief that this will support us in preparing the children for the challenges ahead.

We are a team with the highest aspirations for all our children and for our school. This means we will continue to focus on children's wellbeing as well as developing their skills and academic achievement. We will do this by setting high expectations for behaviour and attendance and by providing outstanding learning opportunities for every child.
