Quality of Education

As the first term of the academic year draws to a close, it is extraordinary to reflect on how much has already happened and how much has been learnt!

During November, the Headship Team carried out formal lesson observations of all classes and as usual, we have been very impressed by the level of engagement and enthusiasm shown by children across the curriculum as they are challenged to work collaboratively, explore, discover, discuss, empathise and think deeply. The governors also joined members of our newly elected pupil leadership team on a learning walk focused on the habits of mind; feedback confirmed that these habits are deeply embedded in teaching and learning. When asked what school would be like without our thinking school strategies, the children replied, "It would be boring. You'd always try to do things in the same way and not realise you can think about a problem differently."

This term we achieved the Wellbeing Award for Schools and also discovered we were top of the league tables in Richmond for progress in maths and writing and for maths attainment. Our combined scores for high achievement in Reading, Writing and Maths put us second in the table. Our progress scores for all subjects were well above average. What makes us most proud about this is we did not narrow our curriculum or provide additional classes to prepare for tests before or after school. Our children continued to attend sporting events, chess competitions, field trips and museum visits. They took part in Christmas and musical productions. They had a very busy timetable and no learning opportunity was lost, but school was full of variety and lessons built on what children already knew and were planned to encourage children's curiosity-which is endless!
